Edward W. (Peter) Russell

Chairman of the Board

MR. RUSSELL IS AN EXPERT IN LEGISLATIVE, POLICY, and regulatory issues that affect the environment for trade and investment in financial services. As former senior vice president for government affairs for JPMorgan Chase & Co. in New York, he was responsible for the bank's international government affairs, which encompass interactions with U.S. and foreign government entities such as the European Union. He has served as a credit and marketing officer for the Scandinavian, Southeast Asian, and Mediterranean areas; as a country and branch officer in Milan, Italy; and as a representative in Tehran, Iran, for one of the bank's predecessor firms. Before entering banking, Mr. Russell was an executive associate of the Overseas Educational Service, a nonprofit organization that coordinates assistance for universities in Africa and Turkey. He began his 30 year international career as a U.S. Peace Corps volunteer in Iran. Mr. Russell has a master's degree in law and diplomacy from the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University, and a bachelor's degree in history from Emory University. He serves on the boards of directors of A-Home, a not-for-profit organization providing affordable housing and related services for the elderly, persons with disabilities and single-parent families in Westchester County, N.Y., and the New York Military Academy, an independent secondary school. He is a co-head of the Pleasantville, N.Y., Business Support Council, a voluntary citizens' group for revitalization of the business center.



Roberta N. Clarke

Vice Chairman of the Board

DR. CLARKE, ASSOCIATE PROFESSOR AND FORMER chair of the Department of Marketing at Boston University's School of Management, is one of the leading experts in the field of health care marketing. She is the 1995 recipient of the American Marketing Association's prestigious Philip Kotler Award for Excellence in Healthcare Marketing. She received the 1985 Health Care Marketer of the Year Award from the American College of Health Care Marketing. She also was awarded the Broderick Prize for Excellence in Teaching from the Boston University School of Management. Currently she is conducting research on the effect of customer defection on health care cost and quality. Professor Clarke is the Faculty Director of the Boston University Biotechnology Association. She received her MBA and doctorate from the Harvard Graduate School of Business Administration. She is the past president of the Society for Health Care Planning and Marketing, a professional organization with approximately 4,000 members affiliated with the American Hospital Association. Professor Clarke serves on the Board of the New England Organ Bank, one of the country's federally designated organ procurement organizations. With Philip Kotler, she wrote *Marketing for Health Care Organizations*, one of the leading texts in the field of health care marketing.



Stephen F. Moseley

President and Chief Executive Officer

MR. MOSELEY HAS HELD THE POSITION OF president and chief executive officer of AED since 1987. Under his guidance, AED has become one of the world's leading nongovernmental organizations working in education and exchange, health, HIV/AIDS, youth and leadership development, civil society, and the environment. During his career with AED, Mr. Moseley has directed groundbreaking educational projects in Asia, Africa, Latin America, and the Middle East. In 1979, he was appointed executive vice president of AED and director of the International Division. Mr. Moseley began his career at the nonprofit Education and World Affairs, later renamed the International Council for Educational Development. Currently, he is chairman of the Basic Education Coalition. A past president of the Washington Chapter of the Society for International Development, he now sits on the organization's Governing Council and serves as its treasurer. Mr. Moseley serves on the boards of InterAction and the Coalition for American Leadership Abroad and is a member of the steering committee of the International Educational Training Coalition. He graduated with a B.A. in English from the University of Hartford in 1967. In 1989 Mr. Moseley received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters from his alma mater, and in 1997 he was elected to the University of Hartford's Board of Regents.



J. Brian Atwood

MR. ATWOOD IS DEAN OF THE HUBERT H. Humphrey Institute of Public Affairs at the University of Minnesota. Previously he was an adjunct lecturer at Harvard's John F. Kennedy School of Government, the Sol M. Linowitz Professor for International Affairs at Hamilton College, and a founding director and president of Citizens International. In 2001 he served on U.N. Secretary-General Kofi Annan's Panel on Peace Operations. From 1993 to 1999, Mr. Atwood was administrator of the U.S. Agency for International Development where, during his tenure, he also served as chairman of the Overseas Private Investment Corporation. He has served on the staff of former Senator Thomas Eagleton and in key administrative and policy-making posts under several U.S. Presidents, including assistant secretary of state for congressional relations during the Carter administration and under secretary of state for management early in the Clinton administration. He was dean of professional studies at the Foreign Service Institute, and from 1986 to 1993 he served as president of the National Democratic Institute for International Affairs. Mr. Atwood's career in foreign policy began 30 years ago when he joined the U.S. Foreign Service.



Barry R. Bloom

BARRY R. BLOOM IS DEAN OF THE HARVARD school of Public Health until December 31, 2008, and Joan L. and Julius H. Jacobson II Professor of Public Health. He received a bachelor's degree and an honorary ScD from Amherst College, and a PhD from Rockefeller University. Bloom is widely recognized as an outstanding scientist in the area of infectious diseases, vaccines, and international health. He served as a consultant to the White House on International Health Policy from 1977 to 1978, was elected President of the American Association of Immunologists in 1984, and served as President of the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology in 1985. Bloom was an Investigator at the Howard Hughes Medical Institute. He received the first Bristol-Myers Squibb Award for Distinguished Research in Infectious Diseases, the John Enders Award of the Infectious Diseases Society of America in 1994, and shared the Novartis Award in Immunology in 1998. He received the Robert Koch Gold Medal for lifetime research in infectious diseases in 1999, and Cyprus' Order of the Grand Cross of Makarios III, in 2007. Bloom is chair of the Technical Research Advisory Committee to the Global Programme on Malaria at the World Health Organization, a member of the Ellison Medical Foundation Scientific Advisory Board, and a member of the Pathogens, Immunology and Population Health Strategy Committee for the Wellcome Trust.



Sarah C. Carey

MS. CAREY IS A PARTNER IN THE LAW FIRM OF Squire, Sanders & Dempsey LLP, where she chairs the Commonwealth of Independent States (CIS) Practice Group. Her practice has involved investment and privatization projects in emerging markets, including the People's Republic of China, South and Central America, and South Africa. She currently focuses on international transactions in the countries of the former Soviet Union. Ms. Carey has participated in U.S. government delegations to the CIS and in bilateral conferences on legal and trade policy issues. President Clinton appointed her to serve on the first board of directors of the Russian-American Enterprise Fund, and the U.S. Secretary of Defense appointed her to the board of the Defense Enterprise Fund. Ms. Carey also chairs the Board of the Eurasia Foundation, created by the U.S. government to support economic and democratic reform throughout the former Soviet Union. Ms. Carey serves on numerous other boards and advisory committees, both for profit and not for profit. In the early 1970's Ms. Carey helped create a national urban poverty law program based in Washington, D.C., that focused on combating inequities in areas such as public school financing, voting rights, and access to health services. She received her bachelor's degree from Harvard University and her law degree from Georgetown University.



Harriet Mayor Fulbright

MS. FULBRIGHT IS CHAIRMAN EMERITUS, International Child Art Foundation in Washington, D.C. She is former executive director of the President's Committee on the Arts and the Humanities and former president of the Center for Arts in the Basic Curriculum, a nonprofit organization concerned with advocacy of educational reform and teacher training. Her devotion to the arts and education was also demonstrated when she served as executive director of the XXVIth International Congress of the History of Art at the National Gallery of Art from 1983 to 1987. From 1987 to 1992, Ms. Fulbright was involved with the Fulbright scholarship program, first as executive director of the Fulbright Association, an alumni group, then as coordinator, Washington Area Senior Fulbright Program, where she initiated and administered an enrichment program of cultural, historical, and social activities for foreign Fulbright scholars. Ms. Fulbright has a bachelor's degree from Radcliffe College and a master's degree from The George Washington University. She is president of the Fulbright Center and serves as chairman of the International Institute for Leadership and Public Affairs and the Wendy & Emery Reves Center for International Studies. She has received three honorary degrees and was awarded El Orden de Manuel Amador Guerrero, Panama's highest civilian award in 1997.



Frederick S. Humphries

DR. HUMPHRIES IS REGENT PROFESSOR AT FLORIDA Agricultural and Mechanical University in Tallahassee. After his distinguished tenure as president of the university from 1985 to 2002, he became president and CEO of the National Association for Equal Opportunity in Higher Education. Earlier he served as a member of NAFEO's board and as its chairman. From 1974 to 1985, he was president of Tennessee State University in Nashville. Dr. Humphries has made significant contributions to improving African Americans' access to higher education, particularly in mathematics and science, and to strengthening historically black colleges and universities. During his tenure as program director at the Institute for Services to Education, from 1968 to 1974, he provided curriculum development and planning devices to institutions of higher education. Dr. Humphries chaired the state board of education advisory committee on the education of blacks in Florida and the Five-Year Working Group for Agriculture for the board of regents of Florida's state university system. He has served on the boards of Wal-Mart, Education Alternatives, Inc., Princeton Review, and Brinker International, Inc.



Frederick J. Iseman

MR. ISEMAN SERVES AS CHAIRMAN AND MANAGING partner of Caxton-Iseman Capital, Inc., a \$2 billion private investment firm he founded in 1993. He also is director and chairman of Anteon International, a leading provider of information technology and advanced engineering services to the U.S. government and chairman of Buffets, Inc., a family restaurant chain. Mr. Iseman is a director of Vitality Beverages, Inc., and a member of the advisory board of Duke Street Capital, a private equity firm that invests through Europe. Before his work in finance, Mr. Iseman held several positions in publishing and worked on former President Jimmy Carter's presidential campaign. He serves on the board of The New York City Opera, the Glimmerglass Opera, and the International Rescue Committee and has published articles in the *New York Times*, *Washington Post*, *Harper's Magazine*, and *The New Yorker*. He received his bachelor's degree from Yale University in 1975.



Sheila Avrin McLean

MS. MCLEAN PROVIDES STRATEGIC COUNSEL TO international nonprofit institutions. Her prior position was president/CEO of Boyden World Corporation, one of the world's largest executive search firms. Ms. McLean previously was president of the Association of Executive Search Consultants, the worldwide trade association for executive search. Most of her career has been advising and managing large international nonprofits. She served as vice president of the Institute of International Education, where she developed and ran innovative education and exchange programs in Asia, Africa, and Europe. Previously, she was CEO and founder of McLean & Co. which provided advisory services to clients such as the World Bank, and the Rockefeller, Ford, Carnegie and Aga Khan Foundations on building civil society institutions and strategic change. She served previously as general counsel of the International Development Cooperation Agency, which reorganized the US Government's foreign aid program. Before that she spent a decade at the Ford Foundation as Associate General Counsel and the officer in charge of developing and running the Ford Foundation's human rights grants in South Africa. Her career began as a corporate associate at Cravath, Swaine & Moore. Ms. McLean serves on the Boards of several international NGOs and is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. She graduated from Smith College and Yale Law School. She has published several works on international philanthropy.



James R. Painter

MR. PAINTER IS A BUSINESS EXECUTIVE WHO HAS held leadership positions in global corporations in industries ranging from transportation to retail services. He has expertise in finance, acquisitions, and strategic planning. Most recently, while serving as a member of the Board of Directors, and chairman of the Audit Committee of Paxar Corporation, a NYSE retail services company operating in 40 countries, he stepped in to lead and rebuild the company's financial function on an interim basis. (Paxar became a division of Avery Dennison in 2007). He previously served as chairman of the Board of Directors and CEO of Modern Woman, Inc., a national retailer, and executive vice president and member of the Board of Directors of American Retail Group, Inc., which, through its subsidiaries, operated more than 1,000 stores throughout the United States. Mr. Painter began his career with Trans World Airlines and served in senior positions with Transworld Corporation and TW Services. Mr. Painter has served as an adjunct professor of Economics/Finance at Marist College, and on the board of Abbott House, a child welfare organization. He was chairman of the Board of Directors of Phelps Memorial Hospital and served as a member of the Committee on New American Realities for the National Policy Association in Washington, D.C. An Army veteran of Vietnam, Mr. Painter received an MBA from Columbia University and a B.S. in Aerospace Engineering from the University of Michigan.



Adel Safty

PROF. ADEL SAFTY IS A FOUNDER OF THE UNESCO Leadership Chair and President of the Global Leadership Forum. He is distinguished visiting professor and special advisor to the rector at the Siberian Academy of Public Administration in Russia. Previously, Professor Safty served as president of the School of Government and Leadership at the University of Bahcesehir, Istanbul, and elected President of the Global Leadership Forum. He holds a degree in law from the University of London, and a master's degree and a doctorate in political science from the University of Paris. He is also a graduate of the leadership programs of the Center for Creative Leadership in North Carolina and of the Kennedy School of Government at Harvard University. He is author-editor of 14 books, the most recent of which is *Leadership and Democracy*, endorsed by former U.N. Secretary Genral Boutros Boutros Ghali and by Lord Frank Judd, of the Council of Europe



Niara Sudarkasa

DR. SUDARKASA, SCHOLAR IN RESIDENCE AT THE African-American Research Library and Cultural Center in Ft. Lauderdale, Florida, previously served for nearly 12 years as president of Lincoln University in Pennsylvania. A renowned anthropologist, Dr. Sudarkasa is an authority on the roles of African women, Yoruba trade and migration in West Africa, and African and African-American family structure. She was an assistant professor at New York University and at the University of Michigan, where she rose to full professor. She also served as associate vice president for academic affairs at Michigan, directed the Center for AfroAmerican and African Studies, and was a research scientist at the Center for Research on Economic Development. A former Senior Fulbright Research Fellow and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, Dr. Sudarkasa has served on 20 state and national boards, including the inaugural USIA Trilateral Task Force on North American Education, linking the United States, Canada, and Mexico. She was appointed by President George H.W. Bush to the Peace Corps National Advisory Council and by President Bill Clinton to the White House Commission on Presidential Scholars. Dr. Sudarkasa has received 13 honorary degrees from U.S. and African universities and is one of 75 women included in Brian Lanker's book, *I Dream a World: Portraits of Black Women Who Changed America*.
